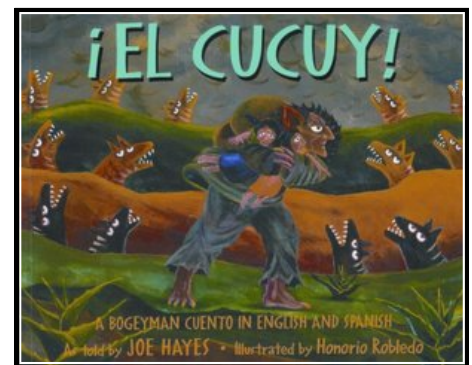
*"Portate bien o te lleva El Cucuy."

Personal Experiences: Who (or What) Did I Let In?

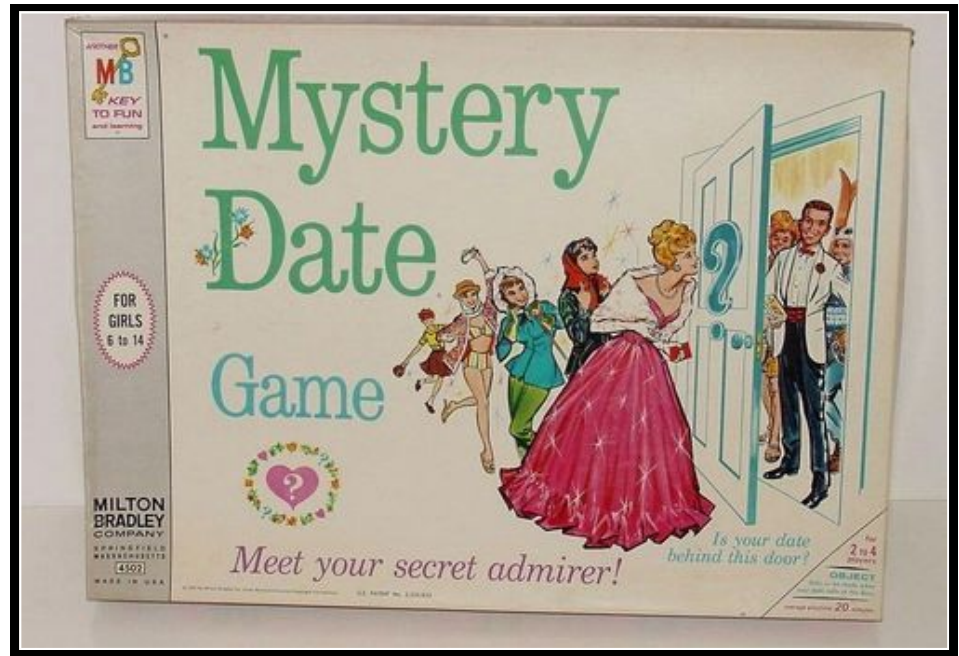

I feel a little silly telling this story, as I'm still not sure what exactly happened. But the way I look at it, if there were a place where I could tell my story without having to worry about being made fun of, this would be it.

My story starts back in the 1960s when I was 12 years old and living with my family in Marietta, Ohio. We lived in a really old house and I used to try and scare my friends by telling them that it was haunted. I really did used to hear weird noises at night and sometimes what I thought were footsteps coming down the hallway, but I would always tell myself that I was just scaring myself and that all old houses make noises like that.

So I used to have this really silly game called "Mystery Date" where you would move around the board and pretend you were getting all dressed up for a date. At the end of the game you would open this little plastic door in the middle of the board and reveal who your date was. There were a couple of cards with different potential dates on them, like a guy dressed in a suit, a guy dressed in shorts, and someone dressed really messy. The object was to end up with the nice dressed guy and not the one dressed like a slob. It was a silly game, really.

So one night I was having a sleepover with some of my girlfriends and I decided to scare them all. I made up this story about how my house was haunted by a man named Marvin who had built the house and then was murdered in the basement by his wife, who cut off his head and then hid the head somewhere in the house. She got arrested and they hung her for her crime. But they never found the head. Then I told them that my family would hear Marvin's ghost walking up and down the hallways at night looking for his head. And sometimes, you could see his headless body walking around. I thought my story was pretty stupid but I guess it freaked some of my friends out because all of a sudden they wanted to change the subject and play games. So we started playing "Mystery Date."



When we took a break from the game to have some refreshments, I snuck upstairs and drew a picture of a man without a head on it. Then I went and stuck it behind the door on the "Mystery Date" game so that the next time we played, whoever opened the door would have a headless man for a date. I thought that would be funny.

When we got back to playing, my friend Jessica ended up being the one who got to open the door for her date. When she opened it up, I screamed as loud as I could, "Oh my god! It's Marvin! He's going to get you!" And then I turned off all the lights. Everybody screamed and laughed and then all of a sudden there was a really loud BANG that sounded like someone banged on the table the game board was on. We all screamed some more and then turned the lights back on. We all looked and saw that all the pieces from the game had been knocked on the floor. The only thing still on the table was the picture I had drawn of Marvin. Then we heard a really loud BANG on the basement door and we all screamed and said it's Marvin! Obviously, I didn't think it was a ghost, but it was a lot of fun. We all slept downstairs that night and every time we heard a noise, one of

us would say it's Marvin! And then we'd scream. I am sure that really made my parents mad.

The following night, I was alone upstairs sleeping in my bedroom when a loud noise woke me up. Sitting there in the dark, I heard what sounded like footsteps in the hallway. But these didn't sound like the ones I had heard earlier. These were definite footsteps and sounded like someone going from room to room like they were looking for something. It was like, "step step step, pause. Step step step, pause." Like someone walking and then stopping at each room. I called out, "Mom, dad?", but there was no answer. Then it sounded like whoever it was stopped right outside my door. The door was open but I couldn't see anything. It was really weird.

The next day, I asked my parents if they were walking around and they said, "No."

Over the next couple of months, from time to time, I would hear someone or something walking down the hall and sounding like they were looking in each room. Sometimes the footsteps would be downstairs but even then it sounded like they were going from room to room.

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One night, I couldn't take it any more, and when I heard the footsteps downstairs, I snuck out to the stairs and peeked down. It's kind of hard to explain, but I swear I saw a shadow of something that looked like a man, except the man had no head! It was just the outline of a man's body, but the head was clearly missing! I don't know how I didn't scream. I only know that I ran as fast as I could back to my room and slept under the covers.

Now, whenever I would hear the noise, I would stay in bed. The scariest was when the footsteps would be on the same floor as my bedroom and I'd hear them coming down the hall towards my room. When that happened, I would pull the covers up over my head and just listen to the steps getting closer. I had started closing my door at night just so I felt safer. One horrible night though I forgot and left it open. I heard the

footsteps stop outside my room and I decided to peek out from under the covers. I didn't see anything at first, but then in what seemed like slow-motion, the shadowy figure of a man peeked around the corner of the door frame at me. The only problem was the man didn't have a head! It was the most surreal thing I've ever seen! After what seemed like forever, I heard the footsteps continue back down the hallway.

I never said anything to my parents because I was afraid they would think I was mental. One night, though, I was watching tv with my parents and my dad suddenly sat up straight in his easy chair like he was going to go rushing off. But then he shook his head and sat back down. My mom asked what was that all about and he said, "That was the strangest thing. For a minute there, I thought I saw a headless man in the

hallway." He just shook his head and went on like nothing had happened.

Well, as weird as this sounds, I lived with that headless ghost for the next six years or so until I moved away to college. My parents sold the house in 1980 and I've never had the nerve to go knock on the door and ask if anyone had seen a headless ghost in the house.

I'm in my 60s now, but those images of the headless ghost are still as clear as they ever were. It sounds totally crazy, but I can't help but think that my drawing that picture and hiding it behind the game board's door somehow enabled a headless ghost to literally come through the door into my house. How else can you explain the fact that the night after I created the story of a headless ghost, that very same ghost is walking around in my house?

Equipment Corner: Working With Laser Grids

I've always had a soft spot with using lasers on ghost investigations. This stems from an investigation around 2001 when, while using a non-contact thermometer, I was able to track a cold spot that, incredibly, managed to stop the thermometer's red beam in mid-air, despite the fact that there was nothing visible to the naked eye. Yet something was there.

Over the years, I have tried numerous experiments in an attempt to stop that beam; dry ice, smoke, swirling air (via a huge fan). No matter how hard I tried, I could not stop that beam. I even wrote to the manufacturer and asked if the thermometer could be broken and was

told "even if it were, it cannot malfunction in that manner." All this left me scratching my head. As the years went by, researchers began abandoning the non-contact thermometers in favor of ambient devices. I held onto my non-contact, though, and kept trying, unsuccessfully, to recreate what had come to be known as the Hanging Beam Incident.

So I was overjoyed when, in recent times, people began experimenting with laser grids as a way of detecting ghosts. For me, this created the possibility of not only being able to detect a ghost, but also to measure its shape and size (based on how it broke the grid) and even its mass (basing that on how much mass is needed to break the beam).

Dark Matters: Twisted but True Review

I might be showing my age here, but while I was growing up, I fed off a steady diet of the TV show *In Search Of*. Not only was the show hosted by Spock himself, Leonard Nimoy, but it also managed to beam

into my house all sorts of creepy, twisted things like poltergeists, Bigfoot, Nostradamus, and even the Amityville Horror.

My favorite part of the show would be when they would freeze-frame the screen and Nimoy would offer up the question, “Is this an image of the Loch Ness Monster?”

After *In Search Of* went off the air, I tried to get my fix from a multitude of TV shows: That’s Incredible, Scariest Places On Earth, and more recently, MTV’s Fear, and Scariest Places on Earth. But it just seemed, especially when these shows started trending towards being more reality-based, that there was more post-production scares and less substance—less story.

So you can’t imagine how happy I was when I stumbled across a new television show, *Dark Matters: Twisted But True*. Hosted by *Fringe* actor John Noble, this series, while not focusing solely on the paranormal, delves into

some really bizarre and, well, twisted, subject matter. I mean, who can resist taking a peek at a show that features episodes with titles like *Tripping With Uncle Sam*, *Honey, I Nuked The Planet*, *I have Einstein’s Brain*, and *Unidentified Flying Nazis*? What’s more, each hour-long episode of *Dark Matters* gives you not one, but three topics that are discussed in roughly 20-minute segments. But unlike *In Search Of* and all of

the shows that came after, everything presented during the course of the show is 100% true, raising the Creep Factor to an even higher level! So while some of the ghost reality shows currently airing might leave you sitting there wondering “ok, is that real or are they faking something?”, *Dark Matters* provides you with historical documentation that the harrowing tale you just witnessed did indeed occur. That’s right; there really were secret experiments designed to create an army of Ape-Men. Yes, Thomas Edison really was involved in some sketchy (and deadly) experiments while trying to prove the superiority of DC power over AC. And as for the research into re-animating a human



corpse, that particular episode will keep me awake for weeks!

Granted, the unique-looking CGI they use for the reenactments gets a bit tiresome after a while. But if you’re looking for something a wee bit different that just might have you buying into my personal belief that the living is a whole lot more frightening and disturbing than the land of the dead, give *Dark Matters* a whirl. You won’t be disappointed!

Equipment Corner: Working With Laser Grids—Continued

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To begin with, I shopped around and tested out several different kinds of laser grids; different wattages, shapes, and even the different designs that the laser could project on the wall. For starters, I settled on the 30w laser as opposed to the 5w. Simply put, I wanted a stronger laser. Once I had the wattage down, I thought about the conditions I wanted to use the grid in. Since The Ghosts of Ohio traditionally have their investigations last upwards of 10 hours, it soon become apparent that we were going to have to modify the standard laser. If you think about it, these “grids” are really nothing more than laser pointers, which are designed to be used in short spurts to highlight portions of presentations.

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Hence the small “on” button you need to press down on. This was solved with a simple rubber washer over the button. But to prevent us from having to continually change batteries during the course of a night’s investigation, we would need to convert it from DC to AC.

Thankfully, Mark, our resident “evil scientist,” was able to whisk the laser away to his secret lab and the operation was a success. After the operation, we noticed that the small ring that controls the grid pattern was a bit loose and quiet easy to turn, thereby altering the pattern on the wall. Mark then hit upon an interesting idea: use the grid itself as a Trigger Item and invite the ghosts to come up and touch it. The idea being that if the laser is sitting locked into a small tripod, the grid pattern should not change until someone (or something) touched it.

So far, we have used the laser grid on one investigation and it passed with flying colors. Once plugged into a wall outlet, it ran constantly for over 8 hours. We were also able to aim the pattern so that it almost completely covered an entire room, leaving room for an infrared video camera and DVD burner. But we ended up not even needed any sort of IR extender as it almost entirely “blew out” the laser patterns. Running the video camera without any sort of light source, other than the laser, allowed us to get a nice, clear picture of the entire grid. And any time someone walked through the grid, his or her body not only blocked the light, but also cast a shadow behind it, both of which were very visible on the camera. Unfortunately, we did not capture anything paranormal during the course of the evening. Still, the night was an overwhelming success and gave us some ideas as to perhaps incorporate multiple grids into a single area in order to possibly create a 3-D image of a ghost... providing we find a willing spirit who will walk into the middle of our pretty laser light show. So stay tuned!

In addition, we'll be drawing at least one lucky Grand Prize winner who will get to come along for FREE!

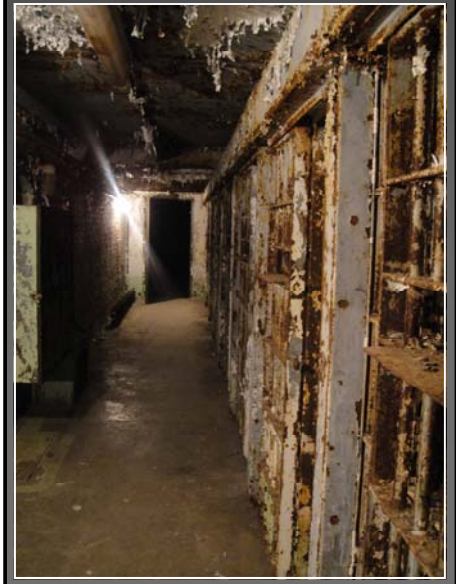
