

cinematic quality, the entire film failed on several levels.

Its biggest failure is the fact that unbelievably—it contains no explanation of the *Missing 411* phenomenon or David Paulides' research! There's nothing about the commonalities that make the *Missing 411* cases stand out from ordinary disappearances, and there's no background to let viewers know how Paulides was able to connect the dots between cases. Without this core information, there's no chance that viewers will understand the scope or gravity of it, and they certainly won't care enough to spread the word.


Instead, this film felt more like a typical episode of 48 Hours. It zeroed in on a few cases of missing children, barely skimming the surface of why their disappearances are so unusual. Unfortunately, the heaviest focus was on the disappearance of young DeOrr Kunz, whose story has been rife with controversy since his parents have been caught telling inconsistent stories. There is a lot of genuine suspicion that they may have been involved in their son's disappearance—suspicion that only deepens as viewers watch this film!

Knowing the plethora of true *Missing 411* cases the producers could have chosen for this film, it's confounding why they chose this one.

And speaking of choosing cases to highlight, it's hard to understand why they chose to only focus on children. Plenty of adults go missing every year under strange circumstances, too; and in many cases their stories are incredibly weird. Personally, I'm much more interested in

disappearances of adults because they make tougher targets for whatever's happening out there. A child can be neglected or abducted rather easily because of their size and innocence. Adults are bigger, they're not as easy to lure, and they'll put up a good fight. When full-grown, experienced adults go missing, there's a real problem. If we're going to try figuring out what's behind the Missing 411 phenomenon, we need all the information we can get to connect the dots. We often have more information to go on when adults go missing. It was a mistake for producers to leave them out of the equation.

The film also made the mistake of heavily focusing on disappearances happening in national parks. In reality, people have been going missing from pretty much everywhere, even from university campuses and cities. But like all of the other crucial information



that should have been in this film, it wasn't mentioned.

If you're familiar with *Missing 411*, you'll be aware of everything that was left out of this film and you'll feel the same way I do. If you're not familiar with it, this movie won't help you understand it. You'd be much better off reading the *Missing 411* books or listening to podcasts that feature David Paulides (just search for his name on YouTube).

If David Paulides' intent was to bring awareness to his research and the *Missing 411* phenomenon, this film was a complete failure. Like I said, it felt like an episode of 48 Hours, not the groundbreaking documentary it was meant to be. It was forgettable.



LORE PODCAST REVIEW

Currently there are 66 episodes in his library and a new episode comes out every two weeks.

The podcast is so successful that it is being started as series of books that will be published by Del Rey Books and is scheduled to release October 24. It has also been picked up by Amazon Studios as a TV series that will begin sometime soon on Amazon Prime. So take my advice and on the next dark and stormy night curl up to

the warm glow of your laptop, cell phone or iPod and listen to LORE.
