

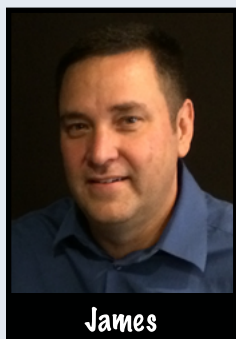

They listened intently, asked pertinent questions, and had in-depth knowledge of the subject. The UFO presentations this summer really opened my eyes to the current landscape of paranormal research, to the point that I am currently working on adding additional dates for the UFO one, as well as adding presentations on other paranormal topics such as cryptids (don't worry, the ghost presentations are not going away—if anything, they're growing). I found it incredibly heartwarming to realize that even in today's turbulent society, something as weird as the paranormal can bring people together. And that in the end, we're really not that different after all.

If only everything else in life could be so easy.

I used to listen to the news on the way to and from work, but not anymore. I can't stand to hear all the awful things happening in

the world these days, so I started checking out various podcasts to fill my drivetime. I like being able to control what I'm going to hear next, but I don't always want music.

Podcasts have been the answer for me! I love *RadioLab*, *This American Life*, *Lore*, *Cabinet of Curiosities* and *Invisibilia*. But more than all of these, I love, love, love *Spooked*!

I stumbled across *Spooked* after catching up on all the *RadioLab* episodes. It is produced by WNCY Studios so I decided to see what else they had been working on. And there it was ... the podcast I had been looking for. Of course, it immediately jumped out at me because I love spooky things. And I jumped right in!

Glynn Washington is the host. (He helped create another famous podcast called *Snap Judgement*.)

His voice is deep and measured. Perfect. He sometimes shares his own personal experiences from his childhood and it is fascinating to say the least. Mostly, though, the stories are told first-hand by the actual person who experienced the terrifying, haunting, mysterious or odd event. There are typically one to three stories shared in each episode and they are 30-45 minutes long. There are 13 episodes in Season 1 and 15 in Season 2.

I don't really want to give away anything, but I will say that while I love them all, some of my favorite episodes are S1E1: "Voice in the Woods," S1E10 "Dollhouse" and S2E5 "37 Seconds."

I have never been so immediately taken in by a podcast before and I screamed (literally!) through both seasons at a breakneck pace. So much so, that I've had to go back and listen again to take it all in. I'm getting ready to listen again for a third time to gear up for the release of Season 3!

You can find Seasons 1 & 2 for free on your favorite podcast app or at spookedpodcast.org. Go. NOW! And listen!

Unfortunately, Season 3 is being released through a new podcast service called Luminary. It's a for-pay service, which has me irked, but they are going to get my money anyway because I love this podcast so much that I can't imagine not listening to it! You can get a 1-month trial for free and then it is \$7.99 per month after. All I can say is – take my money, Luminary! Season 3 is going to have 26 brand-new episodes and starts on August 22. *Spooked* is active on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. Click on your favorite social media icon below to listen.

Gilbert the Ghost by Guido Van Genechten

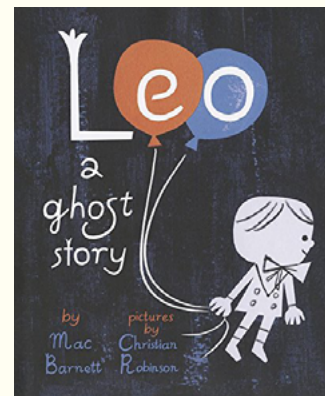
This is a simple story about a young ghost named Gilbert who doesn't quite fit in with his classmates at Ghost School, particularly when it's discovered that he can't "booo" like a real ghost should. All he can muster is a weak "bahooo," which gets him banished to the Abandoned Tower. Fortunately, he makes friends with a black cat named Meow and learns that it's okay to be different.



Sir Simon: Super Scarer by Cale Atkinson

Simon is a ghost who is an expert at haunting; and he's excited that he's just been transferred to his first haunted house. But the responsibility of haunting a house involves a lot of scheduled chores, including stomping

in the attic, flushing toilets, hiding and moving things around, and "standing creepy in the window wearing old-timey clothes." Simon would rather pursue his other interests, like writing, painting and counted cross-stitch. Luckily, a boy named Chester moves into the house with his grandmother, and Chester's all too willing to perform Simon's tasks for him. Unfortunately, he's just terrible. And when Simon attempts Chester's human chores, he's equally as bad. Ultimately, the two settle on simply being friends, perhaps even teaming up to scare Grandma once in a while.

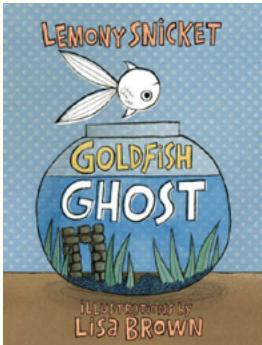


Leo: A Ghost Story by Mac Barnett

Goldfish Ghost by Lemony Snicket

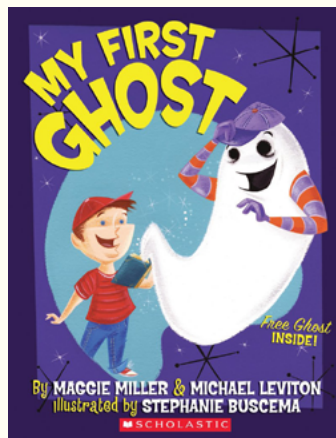
If you're into children's books, you'll recognize Lemony Snicket as the author of (among other things) the Series of Unfortunate Events series. From there he sets off to find friends in the neighborhood, which is difficult when no one seems to even notice him. Unsuccessful in his efforts, he decides to return to his bowl, only to discover a new fish living there! Where could he go? It's at this point that he hears a voice that leads him to the lighthouse where the keeper's ghost tells him that she's looking for some company, too. They become fast friends and stay together in the lighthouse.



How to Make Friends with a Ghost by Rebecca Green

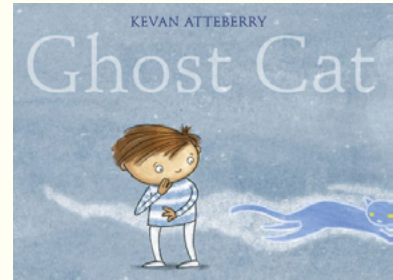
This quirky book serves as a guide to show readers "how to create a lifelong

(and beyond) friendship" with a ghost. Part 1 covers "Ghost Basics," including locating, identifying, and becoming friends with a ghost. Part 2 covers "Ghost Care," and Part 3 is all about "Growing Together." A ghost will be there through every stage of life, even after the end comes. This is an unusual but sweet story.



My First Ghost by Maggie Miller

The cover says, "Free Ghost Inside!" and once children open the book, they are congratulated with "Your house is now officially haunted!" What follows is a fun guide book about caring for your new ghost friend, including how to know your ghost is there (Noise behind you? Turn around. Cold spot? You bumped into your ghost. Hiccups? Your ghost is tickling you...), how to keep your ghost healthy, and activities your ghost may enjoy. "A ghost is like a brother or sister, but better." This book is an entertaining read for any kid!



Ghost Cat by Kevan Atteberry

I was so moved by this simple story that I brought it along to August's Ghosts of Ohio meeting to share with the group. It begins with a young boy who matter-of-factly states that "There is a ghost in my house." He suspects it's a cat because "I used to have one." At first, he only catches glimpses here and there, then hears noises and notices things knocked over. When he finally sees the ghost cat, he follows it as it disappears through the front door. On the other side of the door? A small kitten sitting on the front stoop. It seems the ghost cat led the boy to his new kitty, and the last page shows the three – yes, three – of them sleeping in the boy's bed. It's an unbelievably sweet, moving story that still has me in tears every time I read it.

Children's books really do run the gamut of any subject you can imagine. If you're adamant that you don't want to read anything Halloween just yet, rest assured that there is a plethora of spooky stories out there (featuring ghosts, monsters, mummies, and so much more) without any mention of Halloween. This is true for picture books as well as readers and chapter books. All you have to do is ask your local librarian!

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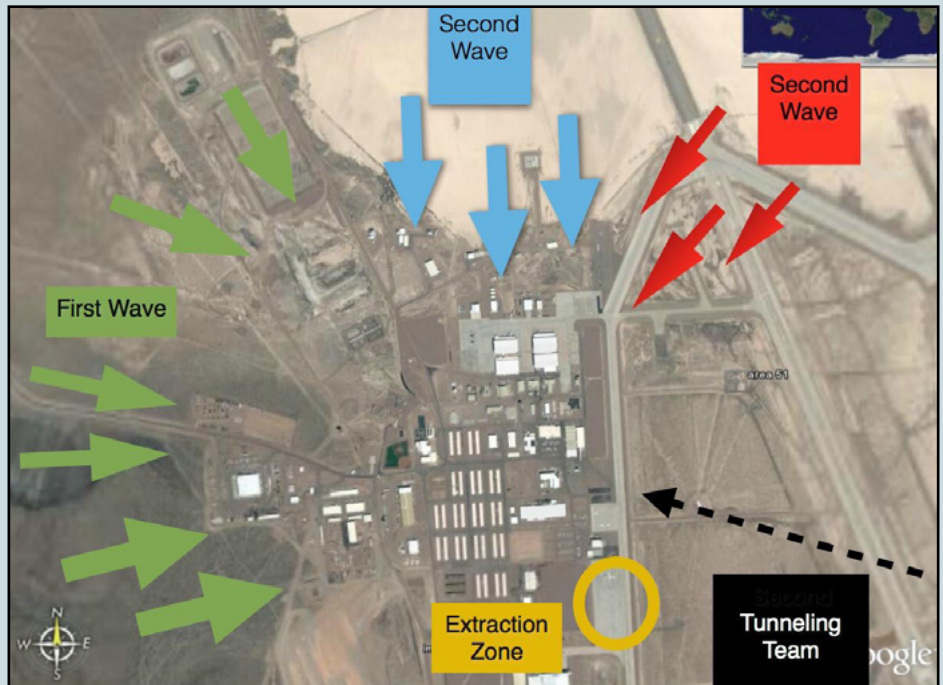

Bob Lazar: Area 51 & Flying Saucers (2018)

Recently, the entire paranormal world was abuzz about a new documentary being released about an enigmatic figure in the UFO field, Bob Lazar. Trailers for the film promised that viewers would finally “discover the unbelievable true story, thirty years in the making.” But before we get to the film itself, perhaps a bit of background on Lazar is required.

Even if the name Bob Lazar doesn't ring a bell with you, you're familiar with his legacy. This goes for people with only a passing interest in UFOs and aliens. That's because Bob Lazar is the guy responsible for bringing ideas such as Area 51 (yes, the very same Area 51 people want to “storm”—see elsewhere in this newsletter) being home to recovered alien spaceships and technology. Some would even say that without Bob Lazar, there would be no Area 51.

Bob Lazar first entered into UFO lore in the late 1980s. In a nutshell, Lazar came forward and claimed that he had been employed by the government to work in an area known as S-4, part of the whole Groom Lake facility that also includes the infamous Area 51. Lazar further claimed that his primary work focused on trying to reverse engineer what he came to believe was alien technology that was not of this Earth. Lazar's world came tumbling down after he invited some friends to go out near the base one night and videotape a UFO test flight the military was conducting. They were caught and Lazar was fired.

Things got even weirder when people who interviewed Lazar did a background check and could find nothing in his work history to substantiate his story. Lazar claimed it was because the government had unceremoniously wiped all that information when he was fired. Of course, skeptics used it as evidence that Lazar was making the whole thing up. What followed was a firestorm as both sides claimed to know the truth about Bob Lazar and his incredible story. Lazar, for the most part, retreated into his own private world and tried to stay out of things. Eventually, the whole thing blew over and Lazar faded into obscurity, rarely granting interviews. Until now. And there you have the source of all the buzz around this documentary—Bob Lazar was finally going to set the record straight and explain once and for all what really happened back in the 1980s when he went public with his claims about alien technology. That's what had so many people excited about this new documentary. Sadly, *Bob Lazar: Area 51 & Flying Saucers* doesn't even come close to delivering, which is an incredible disappointment given the implied subject matter—Bob Lazar.

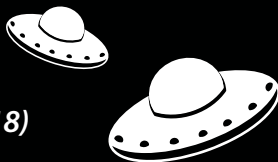
I say this because even though Lazar's name is in the title, writer/director

Jeremy Kenyon Lockyer Corbell goes out of his way to show that this is his film. There are subtle clues regarding this right out of the gate, with the title *Extraordinary Beliefs* by Jeremy Kenyon Lockyer Corbell being one of the first things to flash across the screen. It would appear that Corbell is working on a series of films under the “Extraordinary Beliefs” flag and that this is just the most recent. Fair enough. But when *Bob Lazar: Area 51 & Flying Saucers* finally comes up a screen, it is followed by “Featuring Bob Lazar.” That's right, a movie supposedly ABOUT Bob Lazar merely FEATURES Bob Lazar. So Corbell is already making sure we know this is his film while downplaying Bob Lazar's role. And we're still in the opening credits, and it only gets worse as the film wears on and Corbell keeps needlessly inserting himself into the film.

In fact, a significant portion of the film is nothing more than a long, drawn-out speakerphone conversation that Corbell has with co-producer, George Knapp. Granted, Corbell and Knapp are at least talking about Lazar, but for the entire conversation, Corbell films himself holding his phone and alternating between trying to look pensive and quizzical. And he films himself from two different angles, randomly cutting back and forth between the two.

It starts to feel as if Corbell wants the film to be all about him. And it's not. But it is ultimately what dooms the film.

That's not to say that Bob Lazar doesn't feature in the film, because he does. Sadly, most of it is through replaying old TV interviews. But there are instances where the modern-day Lazar sits down and starts to talk about what happened back in the 80s and the lasting impact it has had on him. This is the point where everyone watching the film is sure to sit up and lean in closer to the TV. This is the stuff we have been waiting decades to hear. And looking at the years of pain and anguish in Lazar's eyes, you know that whatever happened, it has clearly taken its toll on Lazar. So you hold your breath and wait to hear what Lazar has to say. Only he never gets to say anything because every time the film appears to be heading in the right direction, it spins wildly out of control. This film is ripe with jarring, cheap effects like intentional static, random visuals and stock footage sans context, unnecessary jump cuts, and even random shots of alien faces superimposed over Lazar's own face.

That's when it hit me: Corbell isn't making a documentary: He's trying to make an Art House film. This might explain why Corbell conducted an interview of George Knapp while Knapp is standing alongside an indoor pool, meaning every single word that comes out of Knapp's mouth bounces around

the walls and continually echoes. Corbell might have thought it would appear and sound artsy, but it doesn't. It's just a mess.

And while the Art House explanation might explain a lot of decisions, it can't do anything to explain away the most distracting part of the film: the narrator. Yes, for reasons known only to Corbell, a large portion of *Bob Lazar: Area 51 & Flying Saucers* features a narrator. And get this, it's not Corbell, Bob Lazar, or even George Knapp. It's none other than Mickey Rourke (*9½ Weeks*, *Sin City*, *The Wrestler*).

Rourke tries his best to mumble and growl his way through the script, but it's not like Corbell gave him much to work with. Take, for example, this gem where Rourke is describing the desert surrounding Area 51:

*The mountains appear to float like dry lake beds, like spaceships from another world. They seem to ride on a viscous material, channeled through empty space by heat that rises and separates. It vitrifies everything it contacts, like a—like a green glass honey. A g**damn psychedelic liquid drowning the emptiness with imagination.*

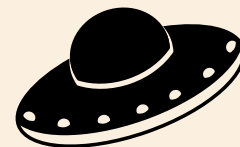
Good stuff, to be sure. But Rourke's best line comes when he ponders what exactly is going on inside the top secret base:

*What are they building in the desert, north of Las Vegas? What are they hiding? What the f**k are they hiding?*

Suffice to say, the film is a hot mess. A shame, really, because it had so much potential and Bob Lazar did seem as though he wanted to set the record straight. But even if he had, I'm not sure it would have come through clear enough after Corbell got through editing it.

Those already familiar with Bob Lazar might find a few nuggets buried within this film to make viewing worthwhile. But anyone not in the know already will do well to avoid Bob Lazar and instead search online for his other interviews, almost all of which are much more cohesive than this film.

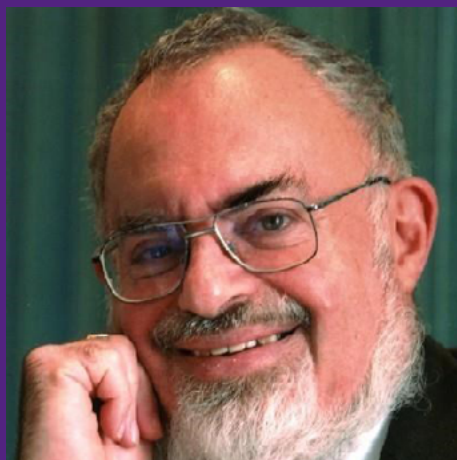

WE MOURN, BUT HAVE WE LEARNED?

The past few months have not been kind to the paranormal field in that we lost several big names—most notably Lorraine Warren, Stanton Friedman, and Rosemary Ellen Guiley. Love or loathe them, these three people are considered pioneers in their respective fields.

With their deaths coming so close together, it allowed me to notice a trend in people's reaction to the news. It usually started with a sharing of the obituary or news report on social media, followed shortly thereafter with the posting of condolences and perhaps a brief snippet about how much we knew/respected the person and how they will be missed. And then for the most part, that's it. Sure, a few people out there will scour the Internet to see when everyone's favorite paranormal shyster decides to fire up his ol' Mystical Magical Box of Wonder and Lies and claim he's made contact with the newly departed spirits. But by and large, that's it. We move on. And we forget.

Sadly, this is not something reserved only for the paranormal field. Part of the healing process often involves

distancing oneself, if only to make the pain of having lost someone a tiny bit more bearable. But now more than ever, in the paranormal field, we need to do more. Yes, we can mourn, but we also need to learn.

By that, I mean that with each passing year, more and more of the trendsetters and pioneers in the field of paranormal research are passing away. And unless we take what they have given us and start applying it (or questioning and then discarding it) to our own practices and research, an entire generation of paranormal research will be lost.

Here's the interesting bit: You don't even have to had liked the person to learn from them.

Let's take, for example, Lorraine Warren. Lorraine was a very polarizing figure in the paranormal field because while many people admired her work, just as many, myself included, found her methodologies, theories, and overall practices to be...suspect.

But that doesn't mean I couldn't learn from Lorraine Warren. So rather than simply saying "I don't like her," I

dove into the reasons why I didn't care for her. I looked at everything from her personality to her education. Then I looked at the time period when Lorraine and her husband, Ed, were the most popular. That led me to looking at how what Lorraine was saying and when she was saying it combined to make a recipe for success. It also led me to reviewing and researching famous cases Lorraine had been involved in, most notably Amityville. Finally, I looked at the areas where I felt Lorraine had "failed"—the areas which gave rise to the idea that Lorraine might not be all she was cracked up to be. I looked at how she presented herself, what she said, and what she held up as evidence. And I taught myself not to do things the same way Lorraine did so as not to have my methods and evidence questioned. So even though I didn't care for her as a researcher, Lorraine Warren was still able to teach me invaluable lessons.

That's really the only way to ensure that when the paranormal community loses a member, their life's work was not in vain.
