

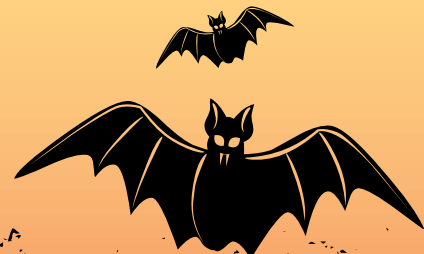
To say that I find your enthusiasm rejuvenating would be an understatement.

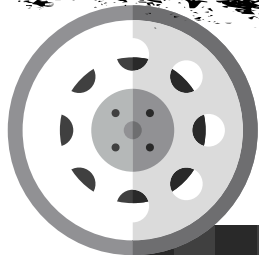

In recent years, documentaries featuring ghosts, monsters, and all things paranormal have become all the rage. For the most part, these docs consist of nothing more

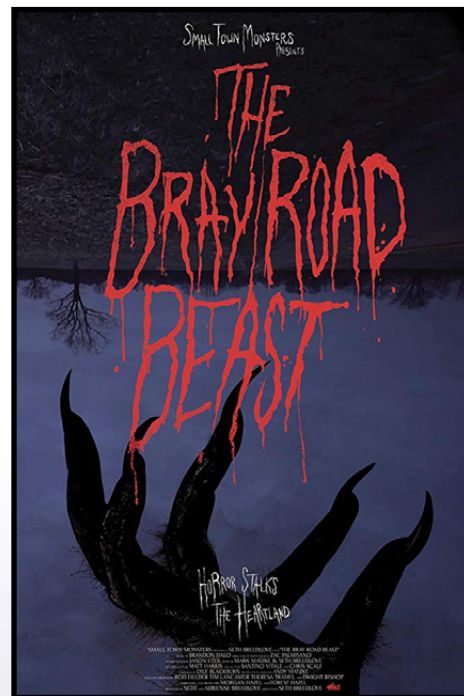
than the standard retelling of a well-known story with the sole purpose being to convince the audience that a particular ghost/monster exists. In a refreshing change of pace, Small Town Monster's latest offering, *The Bray Road Beast*, blows all that came before it out of the paranormal water.

For the uninitiated, the creature at the center of *The Bray Road Beast* first leapt into the public eye beginning in the 1980s when people started reporting seeing a werewolf/dogman-type creature lurking around Bray Road, near Elkhorn, Wisconsin. There have been several books and documentaries about the creature, but *The Bray Road Beast* takes a unique approach to the case, which is evident right from the get-go with the inclusion of Linda Godfrey.

Simply put, Linda Godfrey is THE researcher when it comes to the Bray Road Beast. It was Godfrey who first helped bring the case to light when she was a reporter with the Walworth County Week and covered the sightings in the 1980s. She's been researching it ever since.

Godfrey is featured heavily in *The Bray Road Beast*, which is something the documentary needs to be commended on. Far too many documentaries feel the need to tell their own story by bringing in their own "experts" and ignoring the ones closest to the case. *The Bray Road Beast* doesn't stoop to that level. Indeed, it also includes interviews from others who were close to the case. All of which not only makes for fascinating viewing, but also makes the doc take a rather unique approach to such paranormal topics. Mainly, that it's not trying to convince you that the Bray Road Beast even exists. Rather, the doc is satisfied with simply laying out the story, complete with facts and first-hand experiences from people who were there. It's left up to the viewer to decide for themselves if there's really something lurking out on Bray Road.

The Bray Road Beast also digs deeper into the legend and repeatedly touches on how the story, true or not, still had an impact on the community as a whole, including what people were thinking when the events themselves were occurring. In some instances, what people were feeling—the human element, if you will—takes precedence over the monster itself. It's more of a "boots on the ground" approach as opposed to the standard retelling. And that's something that really separates *The Bray Road Beast* from other documentaries on the same topic.



The Bray Road Beast also separates itself from previous documentaries by venturing into an aspect of the legend that is often whispered about, but never really touched upon. Specifically, that there were satanic rituals being conducted in the area around Bray Road that may or may not have somehow been connected to the beast itself. The doc also seeks to explore some possible origins of the beast, as well as tracing back similar stories.

All in all, *The Bray Road Beast* is an in-depth look at a fascinating case and offers something for those new to the tale as well as people who thought they knew all the facts. Keep in mind, though, that if you're looking for confirmation of the beast's existence, you won't find it with the documentary. Nor will you find proof that it doesn't exist. Rather, you will just be presented with all the evidence and it will be up to each viewer to decide for themselves. And if that isn't a sure sign that a documentary is fair and balanced, I don't know what is.

SPENDING THE NIGHT WITH THE GHOSTS OF OHIO INSIDE TWO HAUNTED LOCATIONS!



As summer started to fade, The Ghosts of Ohio knew it wasn't going to be long before we were knee-deep in presentations and personal appearances. So of course, we just had to book a couple of Spend the Night locations just to hone our ghost hunting skills outside of private investigations. Well, that, and we wanted to have a bunch of new stuff to talk about at our presentations!



Our first Spend the Night was at a location many members of The Ghosts of Ohio had dreamed about being inside of for years—the Anchoage in Marietta, Ohio.

This castle-like structure has been looming above Marietta since it was first constructed in the late 1850s by Douglas Putnam. Initially a private residence, the building was also used as a nursing home from the 1960s until the 1980s. So one can only imagine the energy that might be lurking inside.

For this overnight, we broke into small groups of 2-3 and spread out. For the most part, it appeared to be a quiet, uneventful night. There were a few odd noises and the occasional creaking floorboard, but nothing too spectacular. Well, that's not entirely true. At one point in the evening, two male investigators both distinctly heard what they described as a "woman pretending to be a ghost going 'wooooooowoooo'." They both originally thought it was one of the female investigators, but it wasn't. In fact, while multiple recording devices were running in the area at the time, nothing was picked up on audio. We're all still scratching our heads over that one!



The next location The Ghosts of Ohio spent the night inside of was clear across the other side of the state—the South Main Elementary School in Bowling Green, Ohio. Several of our members had been wanting to investigate a school for a while, considering the amount of energy that must have gone through the halls when it was open for business. South Main Elementary also offered a unique opportunity in that there was no power anywhere in the building. So it allowed us to use our EMF-type devices without worrying about picking up things like bad wiring, etc. Of course, we were all hoping that at some point in the evening, all the EMFs would suddenly spring to life and start flashing like crazy. Didn't happen, though.

Just like the Anchoage, things were rather quiet at South Main Elementary. We did appear to capture a ghostly "Hey" in the boiler room area, but that was about it. Still, a really cool place to visit. And if nothing else, our founder managed to bring home a haunted school desk from a haunted school to add to his collection!

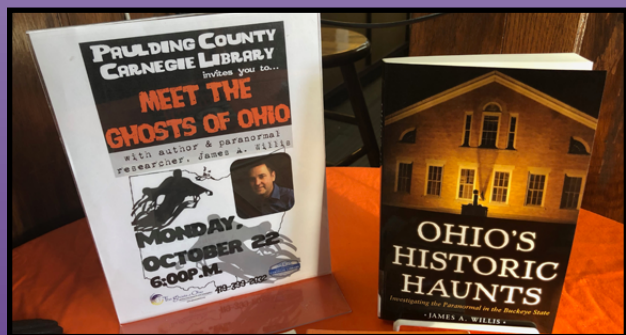


THANK YOU FOR COMING OUT TO SEE THE GHOSTS
